THE Plague has raged with great Violence in this Village, and in Constantinople, for these Ten or Twelve Days past: The Grand Seignor left the Seraglio in great Haste on the 13th, it being discovered that this cruel Disorder had made it's Appearance in the private Apartments or Haram. It is said that no less than 500 People have already died in the Seraglio, and near 40 in the Captain Pacha's Palace.
